WCO members elect directors, new officers, retiring director honored By WCO

WCO members recently elected two directors, new officers, and honored a retiring director during the group's annual business meeting on Feb. 21, held in conjunction with the Forage Symposium at the Chula Vista Resort.

Pat Johnson was re-elected to a second term on the board, while Bruce Dannenberg is a new addition.

Johnson is the operations manager of Larson Acres Dairy in Evansville. This multi-generation farm milks 2,800 cows and farms more than 5,000 acres. He also has experience as a custom manure hauler and business owner. Public perception of agriculture, especially manure application, is very important to Johnson. He is also passionate about helping younger people enter the custom farming industry because there are often fewer barriers to entry than traditional farming for someone without a family farm connection. Johnson and his wife have two children and raise and direct market beef.

Dannenberg is co-owner of Triple D Farms in Mineral Point. He manages crops for the 2,000-acre farm along with spraying and spreading applications. He oversees business finance and insurance, and custom TMR feeding for a local dairy. When needed, he drives chopper, truck, and pack tractor for harvest. Dannenberg also handles most of the combine work for soybean harvesting while the rest of the crew is finishing up silage harvest.

Relationships with other operators, business vendors, owners, and manufactures are what make our organization special. It was very interesting to see how they dealt with in each situation. Many of their struggles were like what we see in the Midwest, but they also had many unique challenges. It was a great opportunity to learn from them, ask tons of questions, and bring some tips and tricks home. I had this opportunity because of the relationships built over the years. I highly recommend visiting a crew either locally or out of state if the chance comes up.

"WCO understands that continued success of Wisconsin's agricultural economy depends on a well-trained





workforce," said Joseph Sanford, chairman of the WCO Scholarship and Awards Committee and an assistant professor in the School of Agriculture at the University of Wisconsin–Platteville. "We also recognize that there are a growing number of training opportunities to fulfill this need, ranging from traditional college experiences to trade and apprenticeship programs."

Kaleb Ellis of Independence, Wis. was selected to receive the \$1,500 Robert Hoerth Memorial Scholarship to honor WCO Past President Robert Hoerth who passed away unexpectedly in early 2020. This award is given to the most deserving scholarship applicant based on their

alignment to the overall criteria. Kaleb recently earned his class A commercial driver's license (CDL) and is already working toward his goal of starting a custom farming business. Last summer he joined a large custom farming crew and harvested wheat and other crops across Washington state and Idaho. Back in Wisconsin, Kaleb is an employee of Dan Val Farms LLC, a custom farming business owned by his uncle Chris Ellis. In his free time, Kaleb raises 85-100 Duroc hogs and rents 100 acres of row crop ground.

Emily Volmer of Hilbert, Wis. received a \$1,000 scholarship. She is a freshman at Drake University majoring in politics with plans to attend law school to pursue a career in public service and government. Emily credits her interest in U.S. history for sparking her passion in government and the reason she wants to work in public service. Emily is the daughter of Greg and Jennifer Volmer, owners of Midlakes Custom Services LLC and long-time members of WCO. From an early age, Emily developed a strong work ethic by helping in the family business assisting with miscellaneous tasks like picking rocks, transporting employees, and helping in the office.

Applications for the WCO scholarship are due May 1. More information is on the WCO website under "about us".

In 2024, three (3) awards will be given: Two (2) \$1,000 scholarships and the \$1,500 Robert Hoerth Memorial Scholarship.

To be eligible, applicants may have direct family ties to a current WCO member or to an employee of a WCO member. Applicants may also be a member themselves. In addition, A WCO member may nominate a scholarship applicant who does not meet the above criteria. For example, if a WCO member has a customer who has an exemplary son, daughter, or employee, they are eligible to apply.

The program has been expanded to include any post-secondary training program including traditional college experiences <u>and</u> career training programs such CDL truck driver training program/ exam, or other industry relevant training programs. Individuals on a non-academic post-secondary education path searching for career opportunity in the industry such as joining a harvest crew or other apprenticeship program, are also encouraged to apply.

HPAI Detection in Kansas, Texas Dairy Herds

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as well as state veterinary and public health officials, are investigating an illness among primarily older dairy cows in Texas, Kansas, and New Mexico that is causing decreased lactation, low appetite, and other symptoms.

As of Monday, March 25, unpasteurized, clinical samples of milk from sick cattle collected from two dairy farms in Kansas and one in Texas, as well as an oropharyngeal swab from another dairy in Texas, have tested positive for highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI). Additional testing was initiated on Friday, March 22, and over the weekend because farms have also reported finding deceased wild birds on their properties. Based on findings from Texas, the detections appear to have been introduced by wild birds. Initial testing by the National Veterinary Services Laboratories has not found changes to the virus that would make it more transmissible to humans, which would indicate that the current risk to the public remains low.

Federal and state agencies are moving quickly to conduct additional testing for HPAI, as well as viral genome sequencing, so that we can better understand the situation, including characterization of the HPAI strain or strains associated with these detections.

Wild migratory birds believed to be source of infection; viral testing efforts continue -Commercial milk supply remains safe due to both federal animal health requirements and pasteurization.

Additional policy and safety considerations

ARIP: During the 2023-2024 legislative session, the Agriculture Roads Improvement Plan (ARIP) received \$150 million. This program is designed to address roads used by farmers, dairy processors, and other sectors that are often "posted" and are in disrepair. Local governments applied through a competitive process and grants will be awarded as a 90-10 cost share where the state pays 90% and the applicant pays 10%.

Manure application permits: WCO has heard of at least one township requiring permits for farms to haul manure. To this

point, the permits are inexpensive and will help the township maintain roads, etc. If you hear of any similar permits being required, please let us know.
